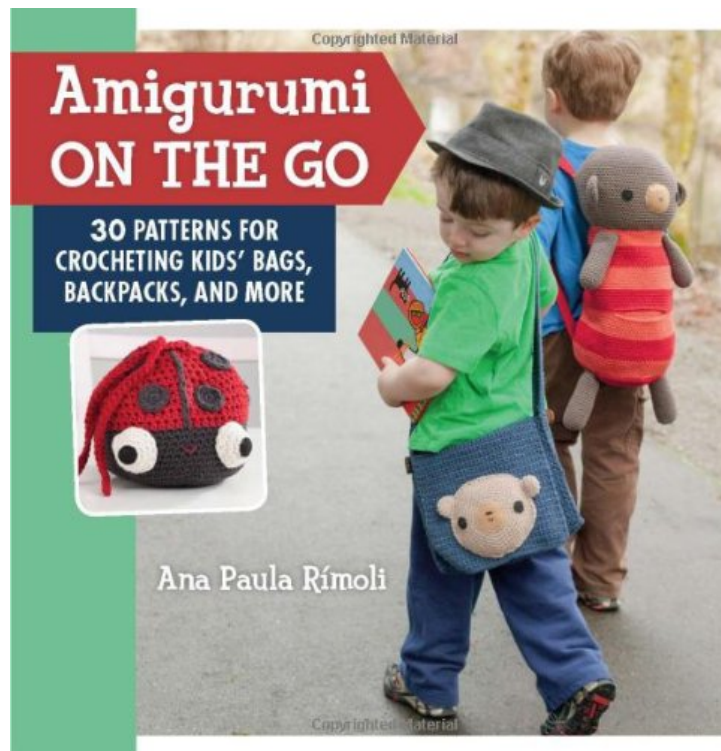

I've come across more than one amigurumi piece that left me scratching my head over a half-finished product (in particular, a train amigurumi project), but such a fate is highly unlikely with this gem of a book. What I really like about these patterns, though, is that this stuff is not only cute, it's useful. When I say useful, I don't just mean, "Look, I made an oven mitt or a coaster I'll never use!" Now, I love amigurumi, but there's only so much room in my house for useless, cute little dolls. With this book, I can make lunch bags, purses, book bags, and other such things. It says it's for kids, but you could easily adjust the patterns for adult-sized merchandise. Now, the only project I made from this so far is the turtle lunch bag. (I know, I'm raving after only making one of thirty, but I'm in grad school. What do you want from me?) It's cute and functional, but you're definitely not going to fit a Hungry Man in there. This is more for small pieces, like a sandwich, fruit, chips, etc. If you're the type, it'll certainly fit a bento box, although not the big square ones that I saw men using while in Japan. All in all, it's definitely worth the price to grab these patterns, and I'm saying that as a Pinterest-addict who pins free patterns all the time. I'd definitely recommend the ebook over the print version. I got the ebook, and it's

simple beautiful on both my Kindle and my Samsung tablet. In Japanese "ami" means crocheted and "nuigurumi" means a stuffed doll. Ana Paula has 30 patterns for crocheting kids' bags, backpacks and more in this book. Boys and girls will love the animal faced projects. Who couldn't use a backpack to tote around an apple in a cozy, a coin purse to hold change for a carton of milk and a pencil case. The designs are knit using worsted weight yarn in cotton fiber. Its large print, easy to read and follow pattern rows are perfect to get you started. Large clear pictures help you decide which amigurumi accessory to crochet first. The General Guidelines have step by step line drawings for learning to chain and moving on to create a slip stitch, single crochet, half double and double are included. Ana will also show you how to increase and decrease in this section. There is a Roundie, Octopus, Fish and other bags to choose from. They are cute, useful and the sizes vary to hold whatever they have in mind. These patterns would make a great gift.
