Each theme has projects for the same decorations for a wedding from invitations to centerpieces. Variations are given for some of the projects to use the same directions for a different theme. The directions were complete and easy to follow and include materials and tool lists, timelines, costs, and how to have friends help. Many of the projects could be used for planning other types of events such as special "0" birthdays or wedding anniversaries.
